DMAT students partner with Citizens UK to inspire communities

Dartmoor Multi Academy Trust (DMAT) has embarked on an exciting partnership with Citizens UK to deepen its civic work and to ensure that children, families and staff have a say in terms of what happens in the areas they live.

This work kicked off with 'listening campaigns' at Tavistock College, Okehampton Primary School, and Bridgerule Primary School. The sessions, in part led by enthusiastic children, were designed to encourage people of all ages across the community to discuss what is great about the places they live and what could be done to improve these areas.

As well as fostering a sense of pride in their communities, children are learning invaluable skills through the process, such as leading a meeting, listening and discussing the themes which are important to them. This process has built up childrens' confidence and increased their belief that they can be a positive force for good in their community.

Dan Morrow, CEO and Trust Leader for Dartmoor Multi-Academy Trust, said:

"We are always aware of and thankful for the positive and proactive role our schools play in their local communities, and I am hugely excited to expand this through our work with Citizens UK. The skills which the children are learning through being part of these 'Listening

Campaigns' are invaluable and are also transferable to their everyday life".

There is a brand new mural brightening up the school hall at Chagford Primary.

Painted by artist Anna Higgie, the mural picks up colours from the moorland environment and brings them into the school. The mural also features the three hares that are found in ceiling bosses in moorland churches and which give their name to the Three Hares schools - Chagford, North Tawton and South Tawton.

The mural was paid for by the schools' art fund which was created from the successful auction of promises held prior to the pandemic. The mural is a great way to show how we want to have colour, art and life at the heart of everything we do.

Year 7 Netball

Work starts on the Promise School, Okehampton

Work on our new £10.7 million school for children with special needs in West Devon is underway.

The new school on the Okehampton East Business Park will cater for up to 100 primary and secondary pupils with social, emotional and mental health needs.

The new building is expected to be completed in the spring of 2023 but the school will open to its first pupils in September 2022 using temporary accommodation.



Devon County Council's Cabinet member for schools, Andrew Leadbetter, said: "Devon supports a higher than average number of children with special needs in our mainstream schools. But some of the most vulnerable children need to be educated in a special school.


"Our paramount concern is obviously to provide the best possible education and care for them. That's why we are expanding the number of places we have available for children with special needs so they can be educated close to their homes and communities."

Dartmoor Multi Academy Trust Chief Executive, Dan Morrow, said: "The new free school will have a positive impact, not just on the learners and young people who access it, but the schools and communities from which they are drawn"

"We're excited to get this process underway and continue to expand our family of schools."

DWT partnership in action

We are well underway with our 3 year partnership with Devon Wildlife Trust (DWT). In our journey towards 'Natural Literacy', Devon Wildlife Trust are working alongside outdoor learning leads and school leadership in each of our Trust primary schools. The aim is to further strengthen our outdoor learning provision as well as co-create new ideas to enhance children's understanding of their place in the natural world. Wildlife Champions are in action at every school in our Primary hubs, championing pupil voice and caring collectively for our local environment. Our Wildlife Champions have been thinking about how they can better connect with their social and environmental world. Grounds mapping, the importance of trees to humans and wildlife, identifying birds, insects and invertebrates are all areas of learning this term so far!



Principal, Ed Finch noted "Our young people enjoyed working with DWT very much. The sessions prompted great thinking." KS1 pupils this term will be engaging in 'Winston the Woodlouse' inspired learning, based around developing scientific enquiry, skills and knowledge, linking to the Science curriculum as well as encouraging curious minds.



In Highampton and Exbourne Church of England Primaries, work is underway in grounds development and developing natural literacy. Although limited for green space at Exbourne, the children have come up with some wonderful ideas on how to bring wildlife into the school playground, through vertical gardening, building bug hotels and taking ownership of planters and a pond!

Last term's work at Okehampton Primary School (OPS) on wellbeing was valuable and rewarding – Emily stated 'Towards the end of the sessions, children were more willing to take risks, work with new children and reflect deeper on their understanding of Natural Literacy.' Positive

feedback on the increased sense of wellbeing following DWT sessions at OPS illustrates how learning in and about our outdoor spaces is so valuable for positive thinking and how we perceive ourselves as learners.

Research suggests that outdoor learning experiences enhance many areas of development, including personal and social communication skills as well as increased physical, spiritual and mental health. We look forward to seeing our children's resilience grow through this AWE and WONDER inspiring work
