Mrs Jordan teaches French across Dartmoor Multi Academy Trust and was very impressed with the colourful and well-presented posters. Wren's poster highlighted that you don't need to be fluent to communicate in another language. Jessica's poster included lots of benefits of language learning and including the fact that 75% of the world's population speak no English at all. Okehampton Primary Outdoor Learning

Over the past year, at Okehampton Primary School, we have been reflecting on how the recent pandemic has affected the experiences of our young people. We are aware of how children have missed out on vital opportunities to explore their local environment and make exciting new connections with their learning. The team at Okehampton Primary has therefore begun an initiative whereby we aim to create vibrant and creative areas within our school that will excite the curiosity of our young adults once again.

The areas in question will be completely designed and controlled by our young people, to give them a sense of ownership and responsibility. Each class will be creating sculptures to represent who they are and what they have explored this year.

We have been communicating with many businesses in our local area to source some exciting new resources. Mole Avon have kindly provided us with some pallet wood and have been very supportive of this project. We also have been partnering closely with the Devon Forestry England, who recently volunteered to clear a space for our outdoor learning classroom.

Over the next year, we will continue to create and develop our outdoor areas and reflect and develop how our outdoor environment in Okehampton Primary can be used in a meaningful and creative way.



Chagford Primary at Whiddon Autumn Festival

A group of our Year Five and Sixes performed as part of the Whiddon Autumn Festival at Chagford Church on Friday 10th September. They took part in a workshop with young professional musicians led by Freddie Crowley - a previous pupil of the school - before rehearsing and singing in the church in a programme of exceptional young professionals. This was the first time we have been able to perform away from the school since before the pandemic and was very moving for all of us who were there- pupils, families and staff alike. We're looking forward to lots more chances to perform together and to take part in activities in the community.

Year 3, 4 and 6 visited Holsworthy Community College and took part in the HCC cross country race. We are extremely proud of all our pupils who took part in this race.

Exciting new partnership launches

Dartmoor Multi Academy Trust and Devon Wildlife Trust have started a new and exciting partnership this term, bringing together DMAT's desire to take learning outside the classroom with DWT's experience of working with schools to bring the benefits of working in and learning about the natural world around us.

Packaged as a journey towards "Natural Literacy" DWT will be working alongside outdoor leads and school leadership in each of the primary schools. The aim is to further strengthen the outdoor learning offer as well as propose new ideas to enhance children's understanding of their place in the natural world.



Outdoor learning experiences have been shown to benefit students in a wide range of ways. Not only do we recognise that time outside is good for physical health, but studies show that time in green or blue spaces have a significant impact on mental health. One of the aspects of this project will be the upskilling of staff in using nature as a vehicle for understanding and improving wellbeing, whilst equipping students with tools for self-management. The importance of this has been increasingly recognised, particularly following the pandemic, and is something we believe to be an important part of preparing children for the future.

Academic resilience is shown to improve with time spent learning outside; as it offers a different route to learning, many children also find it particularly stimulating. Alongside this, other 'soft' skills of cooperation, teamwork, communication, and problem solving can be developed in a challenging and stimulating environment.

Integral to the programme, is a pupil voice opportunity called "Wildlife Champions". This is a project that DWT has been running in schools across Exeter for 10 years. The aim is to give children the opportunity to have a say in improving their school grounds for wildlife, whilst also expressing concerns or taking action in their local community. The project will tie into developing our grounds for learning and afford opportunities for children to learn about how our actions can have positive outcomes for wildlife and people.

The project is designed to run over three years with all schools being able to access tailored support for the areas of wildlife and outdoor learning that they want to develop.






Okehampton Rail Celebrations

The Dartmoor Line is scheduled to reopen later this year, heralding the long-awaited return of regular year-round trains from Okehampton to Crediton and Exeter.















Friday 17 September was "Railway Day" at both primary schools and every child worked on something for the celebrations that day.








Bunting from Okehampton Primary and St James CE Primary




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



New Free Special School for Devon!

Dartmoor Multi Academy Trust is delighted to announce we will be welcoming a new free school to our wider family of schools.

Following a successful bid to Devon County Council, the Trust will manage the new Free School presumptive for Devon, which will open in September 2022. The new School will be named the Promise Co-operative School and will be for learners with SEMH (social, emotional and mental health special needs) from the Mid Devon region who will be allocated places by Devon County Council in conjunction with the Trust.

The new school will be located in Okehampton and have 40 places initially for Early Years to KS4 and will grow year on year up to 100 learners.

As a Trust with a strong local identity, it is looking forward to using its strong local knowledge and strong local connections to support all young people – both within the Trust, in the wider area and in Devon as a whole – to reach the best possible outcomes.

The Trust is passionate not only about recognising and meeting needs in the region, but truly impacting the life chances of children and young people across Devon. **Dan Morrow, Trust Leader for Dartmoor Multi Academy Trust,** said "DMAT is delighted to have been successful with this bid and we are thrilled that such an important entitlement for our children and communities will be within the Trust family. This will help us on our journey to be the transformational offer that we know our families so richly deserve. As part of our Trust, the new free school will impact positively not just on the learners and young people who access it, but the schools, and communities from which they are drawn. We're excited to get this process underway and continue to positively expand our family of schools".
